The meeting was very informal, relaxed and fun just to let the winners enjoy hearing about what they were going to be doing for homecoming.

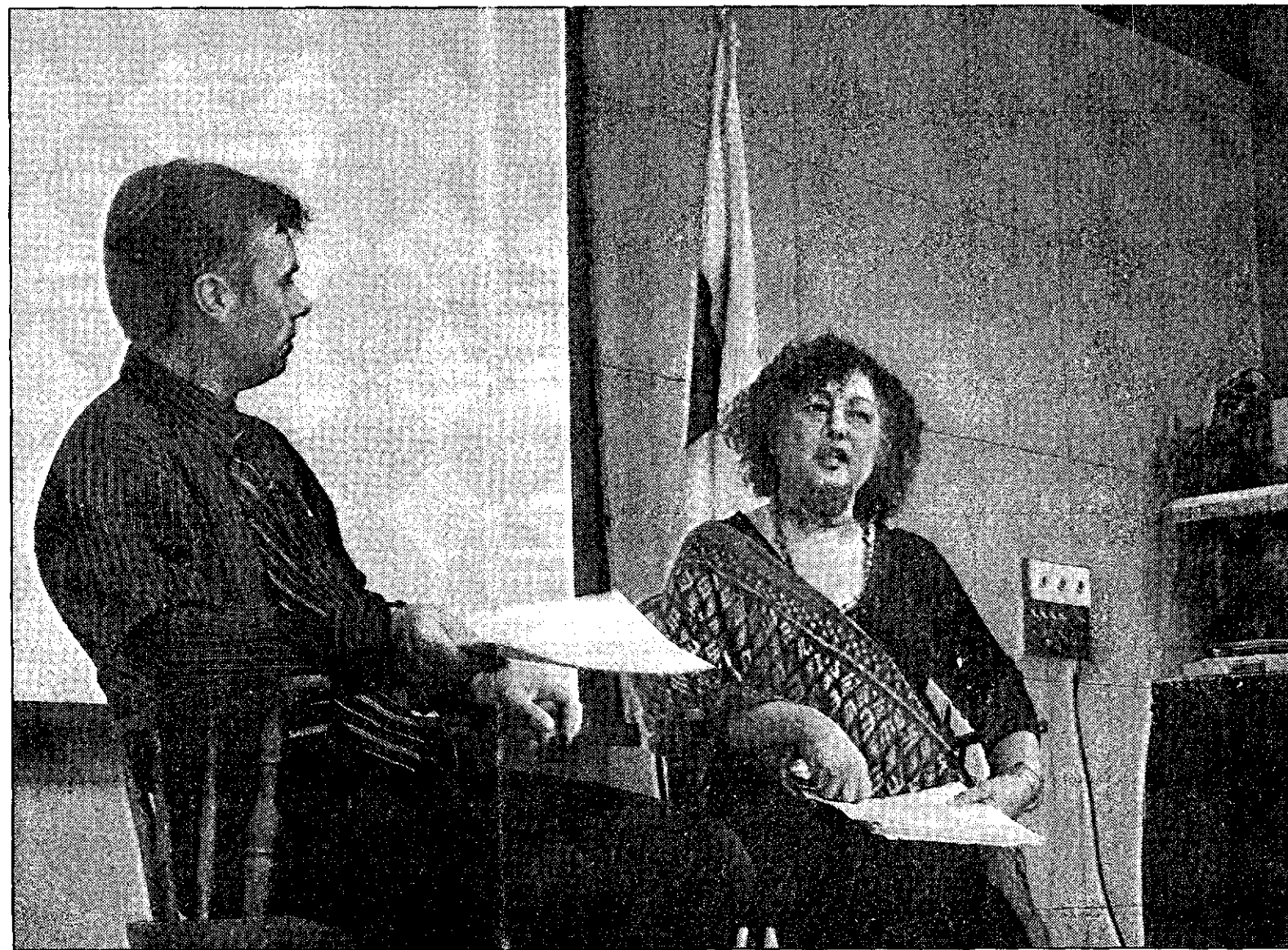
The candidates were told their responsibilities, stage set-up and that they should all be proud they made it.

The court was introduced Tuesday in the Student Center and will be taking photos by the fountain in Falcon Square.

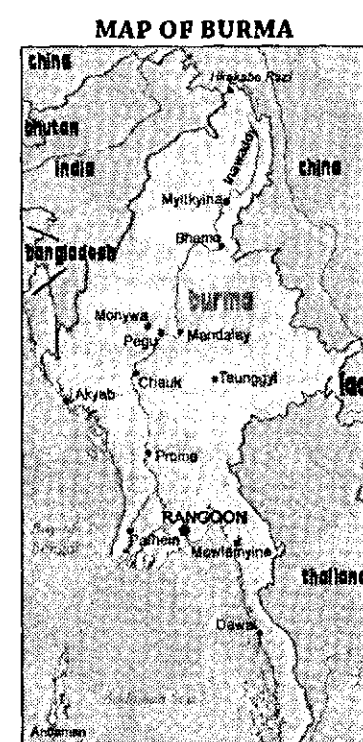
This year's theme for homecoming is "Circus" and there are 19 clubs signed up to make floats.

Burma situation discussed

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Members of the Cerritos College community filled the Teleconference Center last Wednesday to hear a first-hand experience of struggles taking place on the other side of the world.

Louisa Benson Craig, a member of the U.S. Campaign for Burma, came to talk about the struggles that the country has gone through in the discussion entitled, "Crisis in Burma: The Struggle for Democracy."

Dr. John Haas, history instructor, hosted the event. Also attending were Buddhist monks from monasteries located in Hacienda Heights, Norwalk and Pomona.

According to Craig, Burma (also known as Myanmar), which is located in Southeast Asia, has been under military rule since 1962.

"The military just rules by mandate, not laws and it changes the laws when it wants to," she said. "The military constantly undermines the citizens. It rules

by fear."

She gave examples of how the military raised the price of fuel by 100 percent and how the press has been censored.

She also said that the military violently represses any type of opposition.

However, since August of this year, several demonstrations have been happening all over the country, some of them led by Buddhist monks, activists and other citizens.

She insists that the country members don't want any bloodshed, but rather a peaceful way to resolve the conflict.

"We just want the military to go to the barracks, so we can live peacefully."

Anthony Arevalo, history major, attended the event and found it to be very informing.

"I never knew it was that bad over there. It's amazing how long that the opposition has fighting."

For that position, the ASCC is looking for someone who is a fan of sports.

"We have a bunch of stuff coming up for homecoming," Holly Bogdanovich, director of student activities, said.

On Oct. 18, the Homecoming Mock Rally will be held in the Student Center.

On Oct. 22 to 26, the float building will take place.

On Oct. 24 to 25, the homecoming queen elections will be held.

The homecoming football game against Saddleback College will be on Oct. 27.

The Cabinet also discussed whether or not to split the position of ASCC president into two positions for following semesters.

If it remains as one position, the minimum GPA requirement will be lowered to 2.0 and someone campaigning won't need the 500

This event was held to let the college know more about the homecoming court and the candidates for homecoming queen.

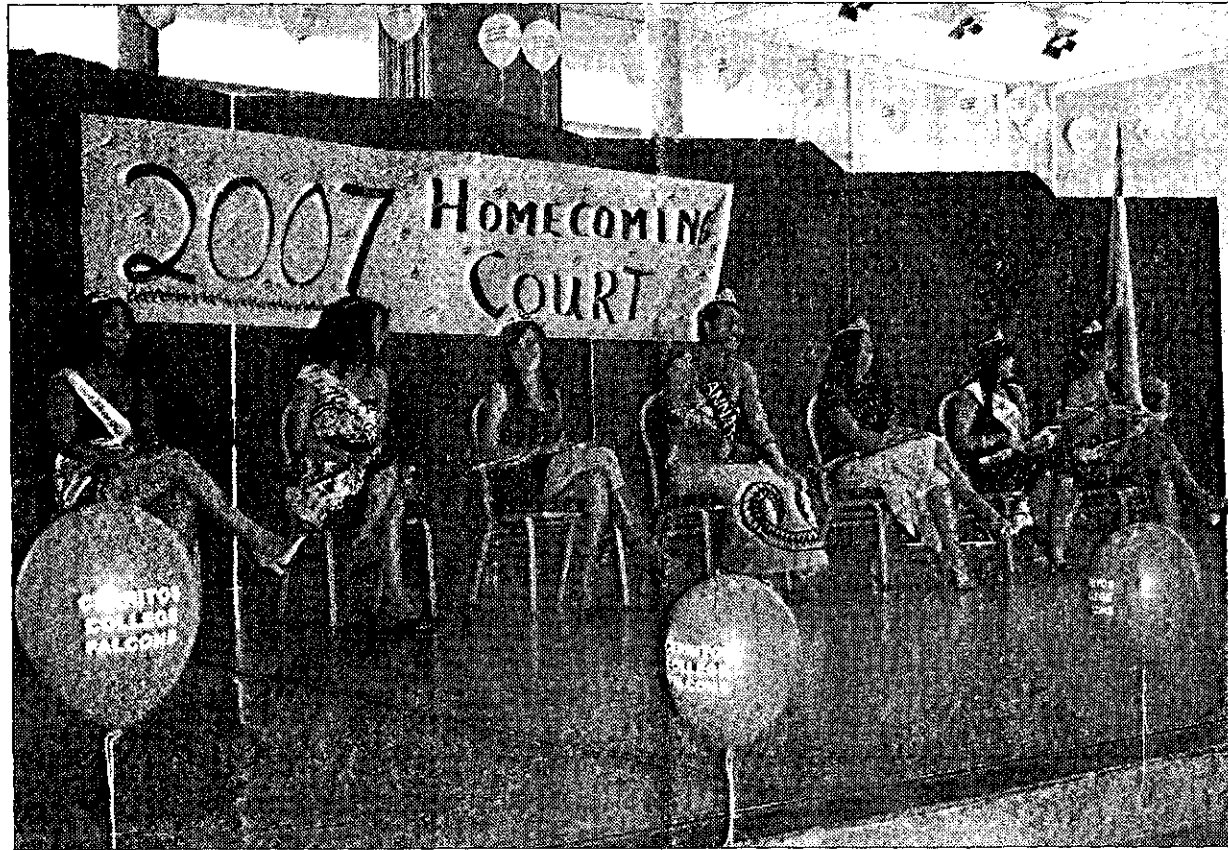
All of the candidates were introduced with a bio about them and after a brief walk on the runway asked a question chosen from a hat.

Holly Bogdanovich, director of

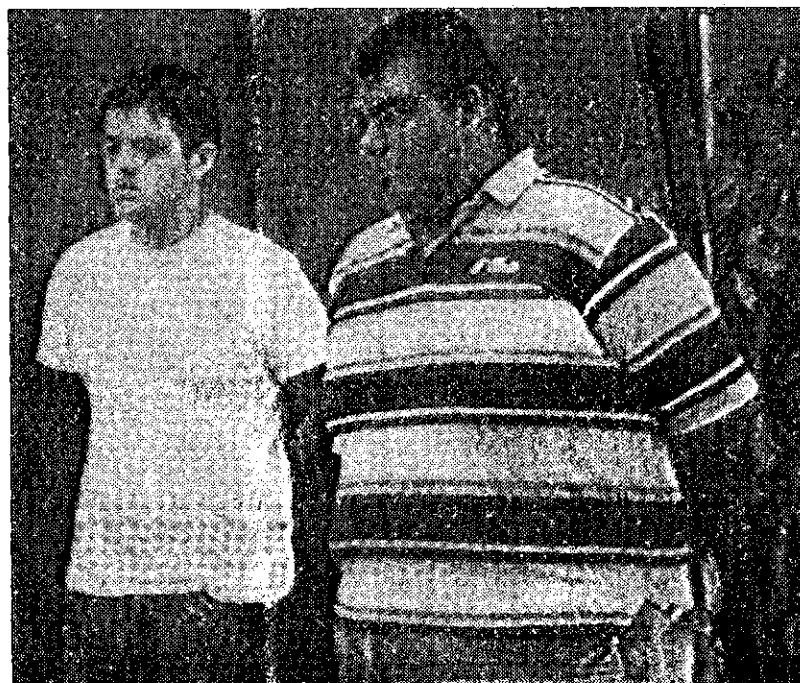
student Activities, reminded everyone that elections are going on and the office could be used. She also announced that homecoming events were coming up and was on the announcements.

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Santa Ana beats football team

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With a loss to Santa Ana, 23-17, last Saturday, the Cerritos College football team starts its divisional schedule with a record of 0-1.

Defensive coordinator Marijon Ancich said, "We put ourselves in a lot of bad situations with the fumbles and penalties and it is frustrating."

One bright spot for the Falcons was running back Lorenzo Goode who had another 100-plus yard day finishing with 112 yards.

Quarterback A.J. Toscano completed seven passes on 20 attempts for 92 yards.

Leading receiver for the first five games Ryan Pettys had only two catches for 15 yards.

On defense linebacker, Doncel Bolt led the team with 13 tackles and Michael Terry, linebacker, had two sacks and one forced fumble.

Linebacker Kirt Puletasi also contributed with one interception.

The Falcons, for the second straight game, had an injury on the offensive line when Mike Diaz, left tackle, was carried off the field with a possible broken fibula.

Last season Diaz was a junior college All-American.

Diaz said that he hoped the injury was just a bad sprain so he could return to lineup in a few weeks, but if it is not then he will miss the season.

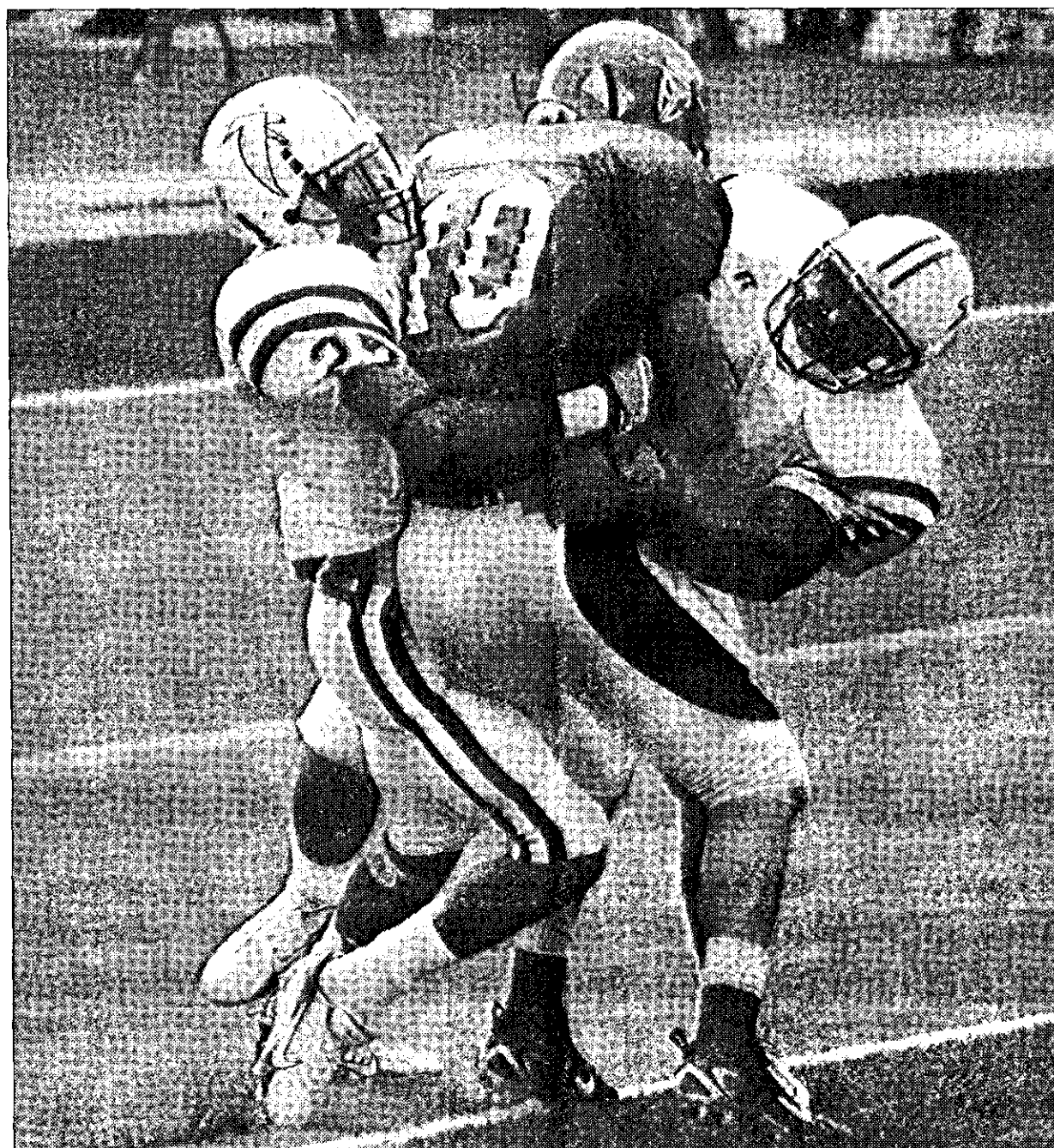
During the last game against Fullerton, offensive tackle Phillip Garcia went out with a leg injury.

"Missing them will hurt our line because they are a big part of the offensive line," Joshua Tuvoa, offensive lineman, said.

"But we are pretty deep on the line and should be alright."

In the first half, the Falcons were able to score twice.

The first score was on a 25-yard

field goal by Jesus Ochoa after a 35-yard run by Goode.

Later back-up quarterback Jeff Fisher hooked up with tight end Anthony Recinos for the 14-yard touchdown.

The Dons scored 23 straight points against the Falcon defense.

During the second and third quarters, the Falcons could not manage much on offense going three and out five times.

Goode said, "They were stunting

inside and we could not block them very well and that's why we could not do much on offense during the second and third quarters."

Going into the fourth quarter, the Falcons were losing 23-10, but their offense came to life in the final quarter scoring a touchdown when Toscano found Ronny Goforth, wide receiver, streaking down the sideline for the 31-yard touchdown pass.

With just 4:41 left in the game,

the Falcons had a chance to go ahead after the defense forced Santa Ana to punt.

The Falcons were able to move the ball against the Dons' defense but the drive was halted at mid-field and the Falcons turned the ball over on downs.

"We played a good enough game to win but made too many mistakes," Goode said.

Their record is now 3-3 and they will face Riverside on Oct. 21.

Men's soccer coach receives red card in tie

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"This was a bad game for us because now we are second in our conference and we are chasing a

very good team in Mt. SAC," Benny Artiaga, head coach, said.

During a very physical game, the Cerritos College men's soccer team tied El Camino, 2-2, last Wednesday afternoon.

The Falcons received two red

cards; one by defender Ivan Perez and just seconds later, Artiaga received one for arguing the red card Perez received.

Perez said that both he and the El Camino player were going for the ball and the ref saw the accidental

hit as intentional and gave Perez the red card.

Artiaga and Perez were ineligible for the team's next game against East Los Angeles College.

"In my estimation the ref was out there to be seen and it is sad

because the game is not about the officials, it's about the (student-athletes)," Artiaga said.

There were only two goals scored in the first half, one by each team and both were scored within the first 10 minutes.

Cerritos got on the board first when Norm Mariscal, forward, shot the ball just past the diving El Camino goalkeeper.

A few minutes later, El Camino came back to tie it when it kicked the ball right beneath the cross bar for the score.

The rest of the half, like most of the game, was dominated by strong defensive performances by both teams.

In the first few minutes of the second half the Falcons let up another goal to give the lead to El Camino.

"In the second-half we came out flat-footed and lacked focus and let up an easy goal," Jesus Ochoa, defender, said.

But the Falcons were able to fight back to tie the game at two when Michael Paz, forward, was able to kick the ball into the wide-open net.

The Falcons seemed to be gaining momentum when the referee started calling penalties against them and often pulling out yellow cards.

This culminated in the ejections of Perez and Artiaga.

"We play a more physical game and that's probably why the referees call some of those penalties against us," Ochoa said.

The game was originally scheduled for Tuesday, but it was postponed because a water pipe broke in a nearby building, causing the field to be too wet to play on.

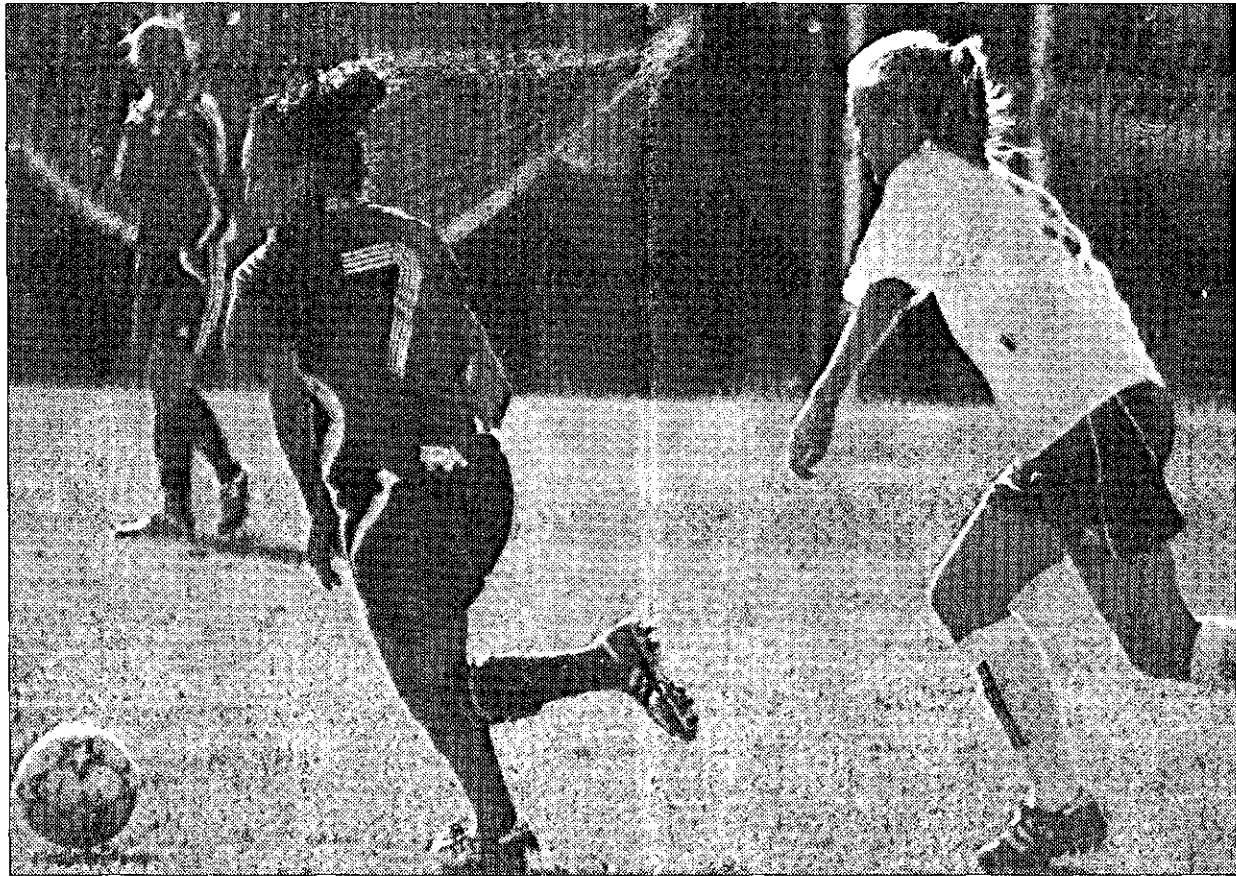
This is the third water pipe that has broken since construction near the locker rooms.

The Falcons are 11-1-2 overall and 2-0-1 in conference.

The Falcons' first two goals were scored by forward Corina Villegas, who leads the team in goals with 19.

Her first goal was scored on a penalty kick 15 minutes into the game.

She scored again 24 minutes into the game on a pass from forward

Denise Vega, Jacqueline Guerrero, and Hannah Llamas all scored one point apiece.

Lybov Tchougounova, utility, scored four goals for Pasadena.

Sara Gilbert, utility, contributed another two goals and Karissa Peltier, two-meter/point, scored one goal. This was the team's twelfth win in a row and Pasadena's seventh loss in a row.

The game began with Pasadena up in a 0-2 lead, but the Falcons brought it to 5-3 by the end of the first quarter.

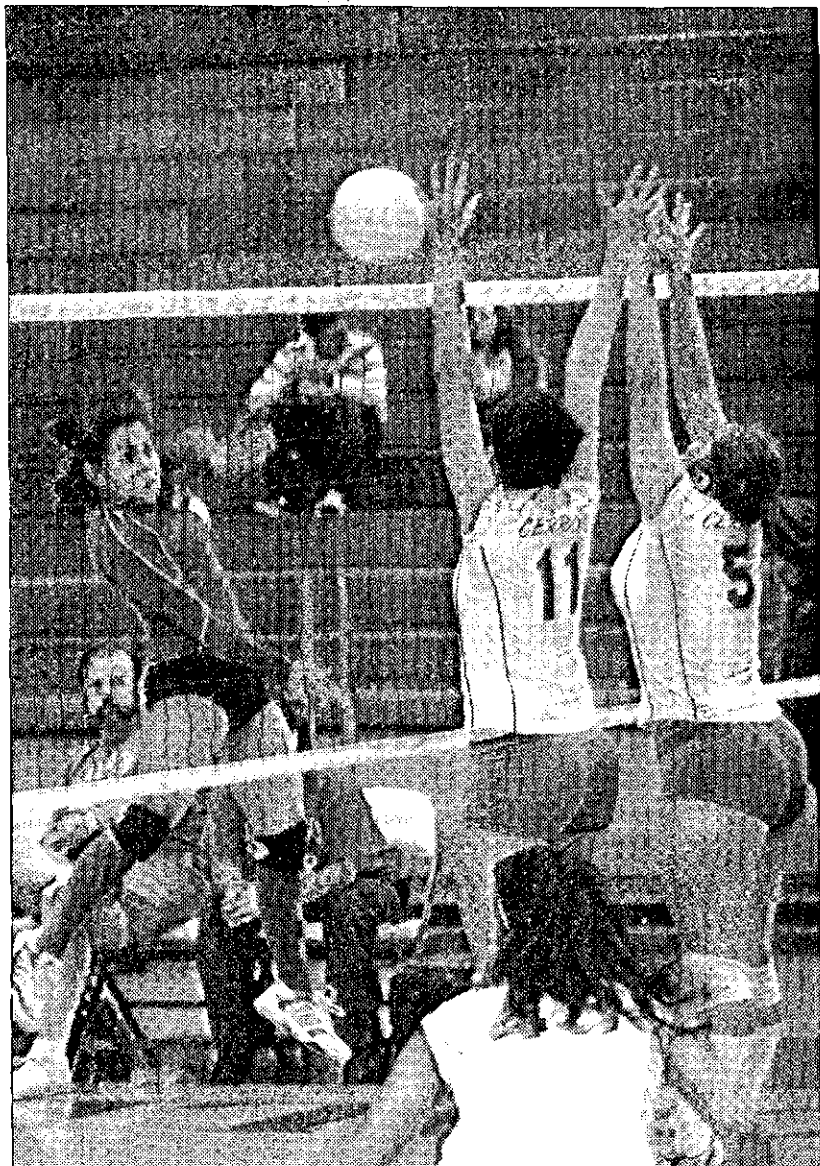
After the game, Jacqueline Guerrero, utility, felt that the team was ready for the Citrus Tournament on Oct. 12-13.
